The four retiring junior board members announced the results and passed their jackets on to the new leadership.

Puyallup, Wash.; Communications Chair Kristin Bielema, Ada, Mich.; Membership Chair Brady Jensen, Courtland, Kan.; Leadership Chair Shelby Rogers, Hamilton, Texas; and Fundraising Chair Elise Hackett, Tuscola, Ill. Also serving on the board of directors are Krissi McCurdy, Chatsworth, Ga., and Jason May, Randolph, Minn.
