

Epitome of Team



Known as “Team Legendary,” this year’s retiring NJHA directors have focused on serving as a team and leaving their mark on the Hereford breed.

Often when you hear the saying “This thing is legendary,” you think of the Fort Worth Stock Show, but for the Hereford breed, four extraordinary young people have put a whole new meaning to that saying.

Completing their journey on the National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA) board of directors at the 2013 Junior National Hereford Expo (JNHE) were Tamar Adcock, Assumption, Ill.; Austin Buzanowski, Pompeys Pillar, Mont.; Jaime Hanson, Comfrey, Minn.; and Matt Woolfolk, Jackson, Tenn.

The group was nicknamed “Team Legendary” because of the strong relationship the foursome developed starting the night they were elected to the NJHA board in Indianapolis.

“It was first brought up as a joke because of how well we were already getting along,” Austin explains.

Tamar adds, “Our combined character and chemistry are what allowed us to develop a strong relationship as a team and led us to

go out and build strong relationships with other Hereford youth.”

Matt says what made the team special was “Everyone valued the good of the organization more than personal accolades. Each of us all had times we had to step up and lead, and other times we had to take a backseat to others.”

Jaime adds, “We set our priorities high and attempted to leave the association better than when we started. No matter what challenge we were faced with, we gave it all that we had to leave our mark in a positive matter.”

Tamar Adcock

Tamar is the 21-year-old daughter of Jim and Jan Adcock. She is a senior at Kansas State University, studying animal sciences and industry and plans to go to graduate school for animal breeding and genetics.

At college she is involved in Collegiate Cattlewomen, Block & Bridle, College of Ag Ambassadors and College of Ag Scholars program. Tamar has been a member of the

Illinois Junior Hereford Association for 13 years, serving as director, reporter, secretary and president.

For Tamar, she says, running for the NJHA board was all about having fun, meeting people and enjoying the opportunities that God had presented her with. During her time on the board, Tamar encouraged juniors to not let a single opportunity pass them by. Additionally, she worked hard to continue to improve current NJHA programs as well as to develop new ones that would take the association into the future.

Austin is majoring in animal science business along with minors in meat science and agriculture business and will be graduating in December. After he receives his degree, Austin says he would like to return home to help improve the family herd of purebred Hereford cattle.

Austin has been active in the Montana Junior Hereford Association for 13 years, serving as president,

treasurer, reporter and a director.

Matt Woolfolk
