

Hereford Youth Awarded \$36,000 in Scholarships

National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA) members were awarded \$36,000 in scholarships from the Hereford Youth Foundation of America (HYFA) during the American Hereford Association Annual Meeting Nov. 3 in Kansas City, Mo.

Chandler Mulvaney, Opelika, Ala., and Tyler Schultz, Haviland, Kan., were awarded \$5,000 Bill and Jo Ellard Scholarships.

Schultz also won the B.C. "Bud" Snidow Award sponsored by the National Hereford Women. The Snidow Award is given annually to a deserving NJHA member who exemplifies the qualities most admired by Snidow, including honesty, fairness,

hard work, enthusiasm and dedication to the Hereford breed and its breeders. Schultz was presented a belt buckle.

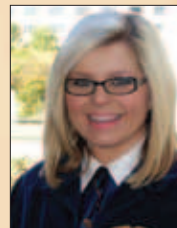

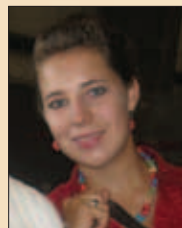
Seely Sayre, 19, is a freshman studying pre-veterinary medicine at Lincoln Land Community
