

Hereford Enthusiasm Storms Kansas City

elebrating 125 years devoted to keeping the breed's records and promoting the interests of its breeders, the American Hereford Association (AHA) hosted its Annual Meeting in conjunction with the American Royal Oct. 21-23 in Kansas City, Mo. More than 400 Hereford enthusiasts traveled to Kansas City to participate in the jampacked weekend.

Presidents get Association update

The state presidents' meeting kicked off the events on Saturday morning. Nearly 50 state Hereford leaders attended the meeting, which included updates on AHA activities and programs. Jack Ward, AHA chief operating officer and director of breed improvement, shared information about the National Reference Sire Program (NRSP). The update included information about established tests at Olsen Ranches Inc., Harrisburg, Neb., and Stahly Ranch, Cavour, S.D., and the new test herd at Amana Farms, Amana, Iowa.

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Ward announced that two more herds have committed to the program: Circle A Ranch, Iberia, Mo., and Ginglebach Farms, Plattsburg, Mo. Circle A Ranch will be breeding 600 commercial Angus cows to Hereford bulls and Ginglebach will be breeding 120 commercial Angus fall-calving cows to Hereford bulls.

"Testimonials are the key to this program," Ward says. When a producer is sitting in the coffee shop and hears that

a "big" producer is using Hereford bulls then they will think it is cool, he adds.

Another exciting announcement was the Harris Ranch project, which is a head-to-head, gate-to-plate comparison of Hereford versus Angus bulls on an Angus-based cow herd. The 2006 calf crop has been weaned, weighed and DNA tested to a sire.

"We have to stop looking at the 'black cow herd' as a negative," Ward says. "It's a positive, it's an opportunity to sell Hereford bulls."

Craig Huffhines, AHA executive vice president, reported on the downtown Kansas City development

boom and how it is affecting the AHA headquarters. He showed slides of a 5-acre parcel of land near the Kansas City International Airport that the Association is purchasing as a business opportunity.

Teresa Oe, AHA communication coordinator, presented information about the 2006-07 national advertising campaign, "The Power of Black. Only Better." Oe distributed copies of the national ad on CD for state associations to utilize.

Following the presentations, attendees had the opportunity to ask questions of the AHA directors.

Boyd Dvorak, Lake Andes, S.D., 2006 State Presidents Council chairman, presided over the meeting. Phillip Moon, Harrison, Ark., was selected as the 2007 chairman and Bob Hug, Scranton, Kan., vice chairman.

Research highlights breeders' forum

More than 150 producers attended the breeders' forum following the state presidents' meeting, which included research updates by Dan Moser and Monty Kerley.

Moser, Kansas State University associate professor and AHA genetic consultant, shared information about genetic evaluation of longevity and fertility. He says that fertility and longevity are nearly impossible to evaluate without a whole-herd recording scheme. Because of the Whole Herd Total Performance Records $(TPR^{\text{\tiny{IM}}})$ program the Hereford breed is positioned to benefit from the data.

Moser explained the different ways to measure stayability and the factors that affect those measurements. He stressed the importance of

Kerley says feed efficiency is a moderately heritable trait, so with selection pressure substantial improvement in efficiency can be made.

HYFA Tops \$1 Million

he Hereford Youth Foundation of America (HYFA) celebrated Hereford youth and their importance to the breed's future during the fourth annual HYFA fund-raising event. This year's casino night theme entertained a crowd of more than 330 Hereford enthusiasts on Oct. 22.

The highlight of the evening was the announcement that the HYFA has reached more than \$1 million in assets. Ray Ramsey, HYFA president-elect and the evening's master of ceremonies, unveiled how significant the milestone is to the future of the HYFA and reaching the ultimate goal of \$5 million. John Vanier, HYFA retiring president, thanked the many individuals who worked so hard to help the HYFA reach the \$1 million mark and urged those in attendance to stand behind the cause.

The auctioning of the HYFA Foundation Female has become an annual event. Each year a Hereford breeder donates a top prospect from their herd to the HYFA to be auctioned to support youth scholarships and education. The Jack Holden family of Holden Herefords, Valier, Mont., donated the choice of two January heifers from the flush of the Holden matriarch HH Miss Advance 0023K and sired by the maternal trait leader CL 1 Domino 320N.

The Hereford Youth Boosters, see bottom of page 23, purchased the Foundation Female package for \$12,500. The syndicate donated the package back to the HYFA to be resold. After heavy bidding, Tommy Mead, Mead Cattle Enterprises, Midville, Ga., and Jimmy Johnson, Red Hills Herefords, Clinton, Okla., teamed up to purchase the choice for \$4,500.

Casino night attendees also had the chance to win spectacular trips and support the HYFA at the same time. Jim and Marcia Mickelson, California; L.C. Whitehead, Texas; Rausch Herefords, South Dakota; and Randy and Kelly Owen, Alabama, each donated trips for casino patrons to win at the conclusion of the evening.

One of the most active locations of the evening was the silent auction table. Supporters donated unique items and attendees had the opportunity to do some early holiday shopping as items ranged from a coveted Bud Snidow original oil painting to antique Hereford framed prints, Certified Hereford Beef® (CHB) gift baskets and fine sterling silver jewelry.
