

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Registration deadline is July 1. The registration and medical release form will be mailed with the Junior National Hereford Expo (JNHE) packet in April or you can view this information on the junior Web site, *www.jrbereford.org.* Registration forms along with medical release documents must be turned in by the July 1 deadline and full payment of \$175 must accompany the form.

The fee of \$175 covers the registration cost, room and meals for the entire event. The fee is non-refundable. Those who will be traveling by airplane must submit flight schedules with registration fees to coordinate transportation from the Bryan/College Station Airport. Flights are also available through Austin (one hour drive west.)

The NJHA board invites you to be a part of the 2006 PRIDE Convention. So mark your calendars and send in your completed registration by July 1. If you have any questions or need further information, please call the AHA Youth Activities Department.

We greatly appreciate Bill & Jo Ellard, EE Ranches Inc., who pledged \$50,000 for the next four years to the capital endowment campaign, totaling \$200,000. Bill & Jo have been instrumental in developing the HYFA program.

EE Ranches has headquarters in Winona, Miss., Fall River, Kan., Pilot Point, Texas, and Whitesboro, Texas. The Mississippi ranch has been in operation for 23 years. This 2,500-acre ranch is currently home to 106 Hereford, 160 Angus and 103 commercial cows. Artificial insemination and embryo transfer are heavily used in EE's breeding program. Today's herds are the results of line-bred predictability with emphasis on stacking great cow families.

The third annual Hereford Gala went down in history as a victory. The efforts that were made will build on the future of tomorrow's Hereford breeders — today's youth.

I encourage everyone to attend this spectacular annual event. It's an awe-inspiring experience to see Hereford breeders supporting the HYFA and helping fund scholarship and educational programs for the National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA).

A Step Forward

Last fall the Illinois Junior Hereford Association and the Illinois Junior Polled Hereford Association members met to make a monumental step that will shape the future of Illinois Hereford youth for generations to come. After much consideration the decision was made to merge the horned and polled junior organizations to become recognized as one state junior association, like many other states that have made the same unified choice.

Prior to the merger, the two organizations had been successful hosting a joint state preview show together for the past few years with entries totaling more than 150 head.

While the cattle may have been divided between horned or polled in the showring, the junior members were there for a common purpose. To many junior members the show is more than just a competition; it is an opportunity to meet up with old friends and to make new acquaintances.

This also offers a great chance for them to learn more about the breed and get a chance to see other people's cattle, while gaining ideas on ways to improve their own herd. The juniors may have had separate meetings but considered themselves all part of the same group. Following the lead of the national organization and other states, they realized the next step was to join together and become one. For the state to combine, both groups will dissolve and then join together as one. This new association will kick off with our state preview show

this summer. A new officer team has been elected to take over right away consisting of members from both organizations.

The three advisor families from each former organization will also remain in place, but as their tenure is up and a family from each group leaves they will be replaced with only one. Within three years there will then be three advisor families.

Joining two associations is never easy and there will no doubt be some growing pains. However, I commend the Illinois junior members for the courageous decision that they have made. This undoubtedly could not have been done without the support of the adult breeders. Great strides are now being taken in Illinois to help form "youth unity" in the Hereford breed...not only on a state level, but all across the nation.

Utilize AI

A rtificial insemination (AI) provides producers a method to use bulls that maximize genetic improvement. AI is the practice of introducing semen into a female reproductive tract by a technique other than natural service. AI is a way for producers to increase productivity. An advantage of AI is it allows a broad use of outstanding sires to increase genetic improvement within a herd.

To achieve successful conception rates one must be able to accurately identify the period of standing estrus or heat. Standing heat signals the time of ovulation. Signs of estrus include increased activity, riding or mounting other cows, and a mucous discharge from the vagina.

It is best for the insemination to be done as close to the cow's ovulation as possible. Usually cows in estrus in the morning are inseminated at night and cows that come in heat in the night are inseminated in the morning.

It is often hard for producers to detect the heat cycles of all their cows. There are many synchronization options producers can consider. Synchronization is often helpful allowing the producer to control estrus by triggering it at roughly the same time for his entire cow herd. Visit with you local veterinarian regarding options that fit your management program.

I encourage all National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA) members to take advantage of the American Hereford Association (AHA) Junior AI Program. The AHA has teamed up with Hereford breeders to provide junior members access to the breed's leading sires.

Youth, with females that qualify for the program, can choose from a list of bulls. This list often includes semen from national champion and regional show bulls of the year. Participants receive semen and breeding certificates absolutely free. This program allows junior members to strive for success.

Have you checked those **TATTOOS?**

Every year at the Junior National Hereford Expo (JNHE) the checkin crew gets to hear the same old story as to why the tattoos in the calf's ear does not match the registration paper. Even if you have been to shows prior to the JNHE and your animals passed checked in, still take the time to make sure they match exactly to the animal's registration paper.

One simple way to prevent wrong tattoos from ruining your trip is by following these simple instructions a couple of weeks before you leave for the JNHE:

1. Take a few minutes and see if you can read the ear tattoo.

2. Check you registration paper against what is printed in the ear.

3. Also check to make sure all the information on the registration paper — date of birth, ownership, tattoo — is correct.

If the tattoo in the ear does not match the registration paper or there is another mistake, call the American Hereford Association's records department and take care of this problem immediately don't wait until you get to the JNHE, it will be too late.

By taking care of this problem in advance you will have one less thing to worry about as you drive down the highway.

Take Advantage of HYFA Scholarship Opportunities

S pring is here and now is the time for graduating seniors to start getting applications in for college. Being accepted to a college or university is only the first step; once you are in reality sets in. Then when you thought things couldn't get any worse tuition and other bills begin. Luckily for Hereford youth there are numerous scholarships available through the Hereford Youth Foundation of America (HYFA) to help with the cost of higher education.

The Ed Bible Memorial, Herdsman, Junior Merit, Pro-Performance, Walter and Joe Lewis, Poll-ette Founders, Golden Bull, Future Cattlemen and John Wayne scholarships are presented each summer either at the Junior National Hereford Expo (JNHE) or at the PRIDE (Program for Reaching Individuals Determined to Excel) Convention. In October the HYFA also presents several more scholarships.

It does take a little effort to fill out the applications, but as a winner it looks great on a résumé and scholarships do not have to be paid back like student loans. It's essentially free money to put toward your college education.

The Ed Bible Memorial Scholarship is dedicated in the memory of longtime Hereford enthusiast Ed Bible. The National Organization of Poll-ettes (NOP) sponsors this scholarship.

The Junior Merit Scholarship is a very prestigious award. There is an application to complete, which is reviewed by a panel of judges. At the JNHE the finalists receive awards. The winner also receives an all-expense-paid trip to a U.S. ranch of their choice. This is a wonderful scholarship sponsored by the HYFA and Harding and Harding Insurance and is made possible through efforts of Jerry Gay.

The Pro-Performance Scholarship recognizes individuals who are involved in their herd's breeding decisions, or who know a lot about the decisions involved in producing genetically sound animals. Pro-performance breeders: Mead Cattle Enterprises, Georgia; Crooked Lake Ranch, Florida; Bent Tree Cattle Co., Alabama; and Waggoner Farms, Mississippi, sponsor this award.

The Walter and Joe Lewis Memorial Award is presented to individuals who are involved in the National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA) and the JNHE. This award involves participation in contests that take place during the JNHE.

The John Wayne Memorial Scholarship is given by the American Hereford Women (AHW). This scholarship is given to two deserving youth who demonstrate strong leadership, character and who are active NJHA members.

NJHA/HW Photography Contest

The National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA) and *Hereford World* have joined together to sponsor the NJHA/HW Photography Contest.

The purpose of this contest is to help NJHA members increase their photography skills through the creative spirit found through the lens of a camera. Entries must be postmarked by the U.S. Postal Service by **June 1** of the current year

A panel of qualified judges will critique the entries based on the following guidelines:

- 60% Composition of photo, uniqueness of photo, creative look and overall communicative power
- 40% Sharpness, color, exposure, cropping and overall technical quality

Winners will be selected in four age divisions: Peewee: 7 to 9; Junior: 10 to 13; Intermediate: 14 to 17; and Senior: 18 to 21 (all ages are as of Jan. 1 of the current year.) Prizes will be 1st-\$50; 2nd-\$30; 3rd-\$20.

All photographs will be displayed at the Junior National Hereford Expo (JNHE) and winning photos will be printed as part of the JNHE show coverage in the September issue of the *Hereford World*.

NJHA/HW Photography Contest Guidelines

- 1. Contestants must be a member of the NJHA.
- 2. All work must be that of the entrant.
- 3. Photos are to be 8×10 inch (in.) color or black-and-white -prints mounted on an 11×14 in. black foam core. Mount completed entry form on the back side, upper left-hand corner or the foam core. Entry forms may be duplicated.
- 4. Photos must be taken by the contestant during the past year. Photo cannot be altered or image-enhanced in any way. Contestants are encouraged to use 35-millimeter (mm) cameras.
- 5. Photos cannot have been presented for competition at a previous JNHE.
- 6. There will be four age divisions: Peewee: 7 to 9; Junior: 10 to 13; Intermediate: 14 to 17; and Senior: 18 to 21 (all ages are as of Jan. 1 of the current year.)

- 7. There will be three subject areas: Hereford Cattle, People and Around the Farm or Ranch. Contestants may enter only one photo per category. Each entry may apply to no more than one subject category. The contestants should declare what subject category the photo is to be judged, as the photograph is representative of the contestant's interpretation of the category. Judges, however, reserve the right to move an entry to a more suitable category. Should the contestant already have a photograph in the more suitable subject category, judges are empowered to disqualify a photograph from competition. Further explanation of the subject categories is listed below.
- 8. A maximum of three entries per contestant is allowed.
- 9. Photos become the property of the American Hereford Association and the *Hereford World* for use in publications and promotions.
- 10. Entries must be postmarked by the U.S. Postal Service by June 1, 2006.


