A Growing Membership Requires a Region Shift

The National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA) membership keeps expanding, and participation keeps increasing in all of our events at both the Program for Reaching Individuals Determined to Excel (PRIDE) Convention and, the big one, the Junior National Hereford Expo (JNHE). Just as in any growing and progressive organization, there comes a time for a change.

Originally, the junior board of directors was modeled after our senior board of directors with four regions, which include the northwest, southwest, northeast and southeast. The junior board used to require two representatives from each region and no more than four from the same region serving at one time. The junior board started finding it difficult to always fill the positions in some regions, but on the same token, the board would have many qualified candidates from other regions and would have to turn those excellent candidates down. The process was changed a few years ago to require just one candidate from each region, but that change was only a patch for the growing membership.

After much thought, research, and discussion, the board decided on a change and has voted to reformat the regions of the junior association. The original sections were as follows: The northwest region included the states of Washington, Oregon, Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, North Dakota, South Dakota, Kansas, Colorado, and Nebraska. The northwest region had a junior membership of 438 members in 2013. The southwest region included the states of California, Nevada, Arizona, New Mexico, Utah, Texas, and Oklahoma. Last fiscal year there were 513 junior members representing the southwest region. The northeast region included the states of Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Delaware, Maryland, Vermont, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Maine, Connecticut,

and Rhode Island. This region contains the most participants, and it had a junior representation of 1,158 members in 2013. Last, but not least, the southeast region contains the states of Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, and Florida. Last year, 421 active juniors made up the southeast region.

As we studied the old regions, we realized that our membership was not very evenly dispersed amongst the four different regions, and that this lack of dispersion was the cause of our headache. We then evaluated the situation and decided to shift the lines of the regions. We moved Kansas and Colorado to the southwest region, transferred Minnesota and Iowa to the northwest region, and

moved Missouri down to the southeast region. By making these region changes, we have helped level the amount of membership from each area. With the changes, the northwest region moves to a membership of 546, the southwest region will have a membership of 623, the northeast region will drop to a membership of 799, and the southeast region will move to a membership of 566.

As a result of the region shifts, the board created an outcome that should set the NJHA headed in the right direction. Words have been spoken often about how our organization keeps growing and changing in a positive way, and with this growth, we have to learn to balance our success and failures, but we also need to understand that growing pains are necessary for positive growth. ◀

Interested in running for the National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA) board? I have three words for you... Just Do It! Take the first step and get your application in by May 1. The application process is a little different from what it has been in the past. The entire application will be completed at Herefordreviewroom.com.

This is the same website we use for the Hereford scholarship applications, so using it should make the process easier and insure that all your materials are submitted on time. To complete the application, you will need to:

1. Obtain and submit seven recommendation letters.
2. Complete a one-page essay topic — "My Goal as an NJHA Director."
3. Upload a color photograph of yourself (suitable for printing purposes).
4. Upload an 8x10 campaign flyer.
5. Upload an NJHA Director Nomination Form to be signed by your state advisor and notarized.
6. Complete the application available on the Hereford Review Room.
7. Double check that you have fulfilled all the tasks. Your application will not be submitted until you do so.

When you submit your application, you have taken the first step in a journey that will

be one you will never forget. Running for the board may be a little nerve racking, but I promise the experience is worth the effort.

Candidates will need to be in Pennsylvania on Saturday by 6 p.m. for an interview with the four retiring board members; Amy Cowan, American Hereford Association youth activities director; and the NJHA advisors.

Sunday morning is the time when the fun begins. Candidates will be assigned to various jobs throughout the week — helping with contests, people registration, meals and much more. Sunday night is the roundtable dinner. Personally, this night was my favorite. I truly enjoyed getting to meet all the delegates, talking with them about the NJHA and answering their questions.

Tuesday is voting night. Candidates will give a short speech to state delegates before the voting takes place. The new board members will be announced at the awards night Friday.

If you have any questions, please contact any of the current NJHA board members. We would be glad to explain more about the process and the duties of the NJHA board.

I promise you that some of the reasons you think you can't run just aren't valid. We still spend time with our cattle, and we compete in the JNHE contests and shows. There are 12 board members, and we all work together to share the workload. The time required is well worth the experience, so... Just Do It! ◀

Next Stop, Harrisburg — Traveling Tips for Your Trip

Several important details go into making a trip that far east. For example, calculating travel time, good spots to lay over and what are the best roads to take?

Families making the truck to Harrisburg are going to have quite the haul. Many people from the Midwest will need anywhere from 15-20 hours to get to Pennsylvania, so it is going to take longer to get to JNHE than in past years. Some of the greatest memories can be made while riding in a truck for so many hours with the family. Someone once said, "It's a great place to have family meetings, because no one can get up and leave" — not to mention the beautiful and historic part of the country that one is going to see while driving to Harrisburg.

The JNHE has never been this far east, so we might not know what to expect. As exhibitors start looking at the map to find the best route, considering places to lay over is a big question. Several Hereford breeders and even some from outside the Hereford breed are willing to allow people to lay over at their farms. If there is any question about places to stop, contact John Meents, American Hereford Association (AHA) fieldman, at 419-306-7480 or jmeents@hereford.org. John has been gathering names of farms where people can stop. He can also help you find places along the route which you have chosen to travel to JNHE.

Keep in mind while planning your travel to Harrisburg that you will be traveling on a turnpike highway. Several interstates tie into the turnpike throughout Pennsylvania. Exhibitors do not have to use this toll road, but know that not using it might take a little longer to get to Harrisburg, depending on

what direction you are coming from. The turnpike toll can be \$20 or more, depending on where you enter the interchange and exit it, along with how many axles that are on the vehicle. So get your GPS and travel safely to Harrisburg. ◀

Take Advantage of the Mentor Program

The National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA) mentor program is an opportunity for junior Hereford members to act as leaders for youth of the Hereford industry at the Junior National Hereford Exposition (JNHE). It gives juniors of all ages the opportunity to meet and work with members from different regions of the country.

To participate in the mentor program, any junior member interested in being a mentor must be 14 years or older and must have attended at least two previous JNHEs. Mentors must be able to have time to check on their protégés at least twice a day, should feel comfortable answering questions and explaining general contest information, and must be a positive role model. Protégés can be first- or second-time exhibitors at the JNHE who sign-up to have a mentor for the week of the JNHE.

What must be done to get involved as a leader for a week or a protégé? Start by downloading the form from jhereford.org. You must have this filled out and returned by June 15. The NJHA will assign mentors and protégés before their arrival at the JNHE. Mentors will be assigned to a protégé from a different state or region, so they can get to help someone they don't already know. The pairings of youth can be found at people registration. At the JNHE during one of the first few days, the NJHA board will host a mixer for the mentors and protégés to meet and to get to know one another. There will be special group activities every day during the week and the mentors will help the protégé with these events. Also mentors and protégés will be recognized during the JNHE awards program.

The importance of the position of mentor is to help make their protégé feel at home during the JNHE. They must help the protégé

learn about nationals so he or she wants to come back again.

You must help the protégé with the rules and give him or her basic information about contests and events at JNHE. You can help take him or her to any contests or competitions that you may be involved with or think that the protégé may like to do. You can introduce him or her to other juniors from your state that are the same age and also be able to answer any questions and give advice to the protégé and his or her family.

This year the NJHA board is working on revamping the whole mentor program. In past years, mentors have not been active the whole week with the protégés. The board is working on new ideas and fun activities that can be done with the protégés to help them feel comfortable with being at the JNHE and working on getting them active. There will be a mixer to get everyone introduced to one another and get to know everyone. Other possible activities could be a scavenger hunt, picture taking opportunities (that will be displayed across the screen all week) and daily challenges that must be completed.

This is a really great opportunity not only for the youth, but also for the older kids in the industry to get involved and to get the young kids active at a young age. This encourages the kids to be willing to do the contests, and they will want to stay active as they continue getting older. These kids all need someone they can look up to, a role model that helps them out when they need it. So please download that application and get ready for a fun-filled week of cattle, family, friends and being a leader. ◀

Individual sales contest

The NJHA board sits down every year and discusses how to make the contests and events at the JNHE more educational and fun. We are offering a new contest this year in Pennsylvania: individual sales.

Team marketing builds skills to help youth become better marketers as they sell their Hereford cattle. However, most of the time, it's a single person who is doing the selling. To give the juniors a glimpse at a real-world situation of selling an animal, semen, embryo packages or any agricultural-related item, the NJHA is going to start offering an individual sales contest. The individual sales contest will mirror what is done in team marketing; however, there will be only one junior "selling" to the judges. Animals are not allowed; however, participants may use visual aids such as iPads, tablets, a binder including information pertaining to the item being sold, pedigrees, etc.

Mentor/protégé program

Another event for new members is the mentor/protégé program. This program pairs first- or second-year exhibitors with an older member to ask questions and learn from during JNHE week. While this isn't a new program, the NJHA board has been working hard to add some excitement in 2014.

The mentors and protégés will be paired together and engage in a series of challenges to help them learn about the Hereford breed, the American Hereford Association (AHA) staff, the NJHA board, and how big and full of opportunities the JNHE really is.

We have several activities for the mentors and their protégés to engage in, such as a mixer where the teams can get to know one another better as well as to interact with the other teams, a scavenger hunt and a picture contest that will allow the mentors' and protégés' adventures to be broadcast on the big screen throughout the week. This is a great opportunity for the juniors to get out there and experience all that the JNHE has to offer.

New steer rule

In addition to these contest changes, the AHA Board has established a new rule pertaining to steers that will be exhibited at the JNHE. If you plan on showing a steer at the JNHE this summer, you must have a registration paper on that steer. Steers must be out of a registered sire and dam. Steer certificates are no longer viable entry papers for the JNHE; please plan accordingly. Also, I strongly suggest checking with your state junior associations, as several of them are voting to follow the new rule set forth by the AHA. We are excited about the change to the steer show and believe it helps protect the integrity of the JNHE.

Where to get more information

There are several ways that you can find further information on these new opportunities and rules. Visit the NJHA website, JrHereford.org. There you can see upcoming events, important updates such as the steer rule, fast approaching deadlines and much more. If you hover over the "juniors" tab, you will see numerous options to look at. The information for the individual sales talk and the mentor/protégé program will be under the contests/awards option. Other options on the junior page include scholarships, PRIDE (Program for Reaching Individuals Determined to Excel) Convention, information for state advisors and links to The Advantage newsletters. Exploring this site is an excellent way for you to familiarize yourself with the happenings in the NJHA.

The newest addition to NJHA social media is the Hereford Events App. Anyone with a smartphone has the ability to download this app and to access another way to keep up with Hereford happenings. If you go to the App Store and search the Hereford Events App, you can download the app. On the app, you can find the JNHE schedule, maps of the areas, photos from events, results from shows and important updates. There is also a discussion page where several people have praised the app for helping to make their Hereford experience better.

With all of these exciting activities and changes going on within the NJHA, I encourage each and every one of you to check out the website, download the app or contact one of your junior board members for any information regarding the upcoming JNHE. Owned heifers

While at CSU, Shane has coached many championship teams, including the reserve national champions in 2012 and winning the prestigious American Royal in 2013. Shane serves as an instructor for two livestock selection classes, as well as co-teaches animal nutrition,

while serving as advisor for CSU's block and bridle club. Shane has had the opportunity to judge cattle in 25 states, including major shows at the National Western Stock Show, American Royal, Fort Worth Stock Show, San Antonio Livestock Show and the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. He enjoys youth events and working with students focused on pursuing a career in the livestock industry. He also helps manage his family's 350 head cow-calf operation, which consists of a rotational cross of Hereford, Angus and Red Angus.

Bred-and-owned females, bulls and cow-calf pairs

Troy Thomas, Harold, S.D., is the owner and manager of his family's farming and ranching operation. Thomas Ranch is a 4th generation operation ran by Troy, his wife Veabea,

and daughter, Cally, who graduated from Kansas State University and has returned to the ranch; as well as his parents, Harry and Kay. The family raises Angus, Simmental, Sim-Angus and Charolais cattle and sell 350 plus bulls annually. Alongside the cattle operation, the Thomas family raises registered Quarter horses and provide custom designed pheasant hunts at the ranch. Troy currently sits on the board of directors for the American International Charolais Association and was the past president of the South Dakota Angus Association. Troy has judged many major shows including Denver, Louisville, Kansas City, Houston, San Antonio, Cow Palace and numerous state fairs. He has exhibited Charolais and Angus cattle throughout the United States and Mexico and was the recipient of the 1987

Steers

to junior exhibitors in the future. This industry has given his family so much, he wants to be able to give back to the next generation and help them develop the basic skills they learned.

Senior and intermediate showmanship

Don and Skeeter Brumley, of Orovada, Nev., run an alfalfa and grass hay operation as well as about 125 registered Hereford cows. They have three kids who were active in the National Junior Hereford Association, Kari and Brooke, who help with the cattle operation and Bryce, who runs the farming operation. Don and Skeeter grew up raising and showing Hereford cattle and were both active members in their state organizations. Don was the junior advisor for the California juniors and later they became advisors for the California/Nevada Junior Hereford Association. Skeeter attended and graduated from Modesto Junior College, while Don graduated from Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, where he was a member of the livestock judging team and received his bachelor's in agri business. The Brumley family raise and exhibit their top show heifers on a national level and have a successful heifer sale each fall. ◀



JNHE Contest and Scholarship Updates

Advisor of the Year Award

This award recognizes one of the most important groups of people contributing to the success of the state associations and ultimately the success of the National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA). Each state junior Hereford association is encouraged to nominate its advisor(s).

Creative Arts

Glitter, glue, markers, crayons and more. This contest allows our artists to show off their talents and is sponsored by the National Hereford Women (NHW). The age divisions for this contest are: pre-peewee, peewee and junior. Art work will be judged and prizes given for the top three places in each age category. The winners will be announced at the awards banquet.

Ed Bible Memorial Scholarship

A NHW-sponsored college scholarship honoring Ed Bible. Ed served as director of the American Polled Hereford Association's (APHA) communication program and later vice president, communication director and editor of the *Hereford World* when the APHA and American Hereford Association (AHA) merged. He was a leader of both the National Agri-Marketing Association and the Livestock Publications Council. Ed Bible died in 1998.

Extemporaneous Speech Contest

This contest is designed to develop the ability of all NJHA members to express themselves on a given subject without having prepared or rehearsed their speeches in advance; therefore,

NJHA members must formulate their remarks for presentation in a very limited time, which is 3-7 minutes in length. Two divisions: intermediate (14-17) and senior (18-21) as of Jan. 1.

Future Cattleman Scholarship

A Hereford Youth Foundation of America (HYFA) sponsored scholarship is given to one recipient who has made an outstanding contribution to the Hereford industry. Applicant must be an active NJHA member and 18 years of age on Jan. 1 current year.

Golden Bull Achievement Award

A bronze bull model from the AHA and the NJHA and a cash stipend from the HYFA and the NHW are awarded to one junior member, 18 years of age as of Jan. 1.

Golden Pitchfork Award

This award will be presented to one state association during the Junior National Hereford Expo (JNHE). The Golden Pitchfork Award was developed to encourage junior exhibitors to work together in the display of their cattle, as well as to create state pride during the JNHE. It is presented to a state association that displays a combination of cleanliness, uniformity in stalling (such as exhibitor cards, panels, etc.) and additional decoration of the area representing the state.

Great American CHB Grill-off

Hereford chefs of all ages should bring their imaginations, aprons, Certified Hereford

Beef® (CHB) recipes and creativity for food preparation to the Great American CHB Grill-off this summer. CHB LLC co-sponsors the grill-off with the NHW. CHB LLC is excited to participate in this great event and is requiring that all contestants use CHB in their recipes. CHB LLC will provide approximately 2 lb. of meat per team. Each team will pick one of the following items:

- 85% Ground Beef
- Flat Iron
- Tri-Tip

Herdsman of the Year Award

This award will be presented to one NJHA member during the JNHE. A nomination committee will observe exhibitors throughout the week and nominate individuals accordingly. The nominees' fellow exhibitors will make the final selection during a ballot vote.

Hereford Herdsman Scholarship

Sponsored by HYFA in cooperation with Hereford herdsman, the Hereford Herdsman Scholarship honors young men and women who take great pride in exhibiting and presenting their Hereford cattle at junior Hereford events.

Hereford Bowl

The primary objectives of the Hereford Bowl are to allow NJHA members to demonstrate their knowledge of Hereford cattle to show good sportsmanship and to provide an educational experience for both participants and spectators in a quiz bowl format.

Illustrated Speech Contest

Sponsored by the NHW in cooperation with the NJHA, the contest's objectives are to develop character and leadership in Hereford youth while stressing education to stimulate and promote interest in the beef industry and to project Herefords in a positive light. There is no specific topic; however, speeches must relate to the beef cattle industry. Monetary awards for the top three placings of the junior, intermediate and senior divisions.

Individual Sales Contest

A sister contest to Team marketing, individual sales allows an individual junior to do the selling. The goal of this contest is to give juniors a glimpse at a real life situation of selling an animal, semen, embryo packages or any agricultural related product. Animals are not allowed in this contest, however, participants may use visual aids and juniors will directly sell the product to a panel.

John Wayne Memorial Scholarship

The HYFA and the NHW award college scholarships to NJHA members who make outstanding contributions to agriculture and the Hereford industry. Not only was John Wayne (and is) an icon of Hollywood and of timeless movies, he was a Hereford breeder. He owned the 26 Bar Ranch and feedlot in Arizona. The NHW honors John Wayne and his patriotism, courage, integrity and talent by awarding two scholarships annually to an NJHA member.

Judging contest

Contestants can compete individually as peewees, juniors, seniors or in the open division and will place four classes of cattle with questions on two of the classes. Awards will be given to the top three teams and high individuals in each division.

Junior Golden Bull Award

Junior Golden Bull awards will be presented during the JNHE. The award is a Junior Golden Bull bronze trophy and is sponsored by the NHW and the NJHA. This award recognizes younger members of the NJHA who are becoming active in Hereford activities and to begin resume-building for their future scholarship awards.

Junior Merit Award

Sponsored by American Livestock Inc., the Junior Merit Award is designed to recognize outstanding college-age junior members and to provide them with further higher-education opportunities. The award encourages individual and cooperative effort, enthusiasm, excellence, leadership and achievement and singles out those who are promising Hereford breeders and beef industry members. American Livestock sponsors a Hereford trip to the top recipient.

NHW Heifer Award

The NHW Heifer Award is presented annually during the opening ceremonies. Every age-eligible NJHA member in attendance at the JNHE can enter the drawing during the group picture time that precedes the opening ceremonies. One junior receives a \$1,500 credit towards the purchase of a heifer from a participating Hereford breeder who graciously donates this credit. It must be used within one year of winning the credit.

NJHA Mentoring Program

The NJHA mentoring program is an opportunity for junior Hereford members to utilize their experience at the JNHE to assist first-time exhibitors at the event. It gives juniors of all ages the opportunity to meet and interact with other juniors from different states and to learn about the many opportunities for participation during the weeklong JNHE.

Outstanding State Member

One junior member in each state with junior participants at the JNHE will receive this award. Awards are made in cooperation with state junior associations. Judging of individuals should be based on sportsmanship, cooperation with fellow participants/guests, attitude and work habits. Individual states will conduct their own counting of votes and relay the state winner's name to the NJHA board of directors on official ballots.

Peewee Speech Contest

Peewee speech is strictly a participation activity for NJHA members up to 9 years of age. The NHW, in cooperation with NJHA, are sponsors.

Photography Contest

Photographs should include Herefords or an activity related to Herefords. This contest is sponsored by the NJHA and *Hereford World* and offers several different categories for entries. Note there are new divisions this year, visit JrHereford.org for the updated rules.

Poll-ette Founders Scholarship

This scholarship honors the women who laid the foundation for the National Organization of Poll-ettes (NOP). Two scholarships are awarded to NJHA members, one male and one female, to continue financing their educations.

Promotional Poster Contest

Poster contest will be offered only to peewee and junior competitors. Sponsored by the NJHA, this contest is intended to promote the 2014 JNHE in Harrisburg, Pa.

Prospect Award

The NHW and the NJHA sponsor this award. One Prospect Award for each grade, levels 3-8, will be presented at the JNHE. This is an introduction of learning to apply for awards and is designed to encourage all NJHA members to start building experiences and to record them.

Sullivan Supply/Stock Show University Showmanship Contest

Contestants are judged on appearance and showmanship ability except for the final round of the senior division, where animal grooming is also evaluated. Divisions are peewee, junior, intermediate and senior. Youth do not have to show their own animal except for peewees, who must show their own or one owned by an immediate family member. The animals exhibited in the contest must be entered in the JNHE. There is a \$5 entry fee and all contestants must pre-enter by June 1. Now in its second year the NJHA is offering a pre-peewee division for ages 5-7. Contestants may sign up at the JNHE.

State Scrapbook Contest

The purpose of the junior association scrapbook is to provide a year-to-year record of the association and its members' activities. Judging is based on completeness and content, artistic balance and eye appeal, and originality of material selected for inclusion.

Sullivan Supply/Stock Show University Team Fitting Contest

All contestants must be members of the NJHA as well as members of the state junior association they are representing. The three-member teams should be made up of at least one peewee, one junior and one senior. Teams will have 45 minutes to fit their heifers for a panel of judges. Each team must provide its own animal and supplies.

GKB Super States Award

Sponsored by GKB Cattle this contest was designed to reward the state junior associations for its members' involvement in the contests and exhibition of their cattle throughout the week at JNHE. There will be two divisions based on the number of cattle that are physically entered at the JNHE. The divisions are: Division 1) Less than 25 head; Division 2) 25 head or more. Points are awarded to the top three placings of the individuals or teams.

Team Marketing

The main objective of this contest is to encourage team participation while promoting the importance of communication skills, marketing technique and an understanding of performance and pedigree information. Each state may enter one junior and one senior team consisting of three members. Each team will try to convince the judges that they should purchase the team's entry by discussing pedigree and performance information, as well as visual characteristics.

Walter and Joe Lewis Memorial Award

The Walter and Joe Lewis Memorial Award is one of the most coveted awards a senior member can win at the JNHE. Three finalists are recognized for overall achievement in leadership, teamwork, skills and competition. Selection of the award winner relies on a point system for participation in junior programs and activities. To be considered for the award, juniors must complete the application and return it to the AHA Youth Activities Department by June 1.

Creative Design Contest

This contest displays the creative talent of NJHA intermediate and senior members. This contest enables the junior member to use computer technology to design materials that promote the Hereford breed and NJHA. All entries will be placed on display throughout the show and even better, selected entries may be used in the *Hereford World* or *The Advantage* newsletter. All ads must be postmarked and to the AHA office by June 1 as all judging will be done prior to the JNHE.

The 2014 creative design contest entry theme: Please design an ad for the 2015 Junior National Hereford Expo that will be held in Grand Island, Neb., June 27-July 4. The theme will be Hereford Nation. ◀

2014 JNHE Health Requirements

HEALTH RULES FOR PENNSYLVANIA EXHIBITION CATTLE

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection:

Pennsylvania cattle must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian with an inspection date within the thirty (30) days prior to the date of arrival at the show. **Cattle Identification Requirements:** All cattle for exhibition must be identified by a USDA-issued

metal eartag; a breed registration tattoo if the tattoo is legible and the registration certificate accompanies the animal; a breed registration eartag; or an ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag (including RFID).

- No tuberculosis test is required.
- No brucellosis test is required.

Vaccination Recommendations:

It is highly recommended that all animals entering the show be immunized against IBR, PI3, BVD, BRSV, and rabies be given after January 1, 2014.

HEALTH RULES FOR OUT-OF-STATE EXHIBITION CATTLE

Certificate of Veterinary Inspection: Out-of-state cattle must be accompanied by a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian with an inspection date within the thirty (30) days prior to the date of arrival at the show. If an animal comes from a state in which Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) has been identified, or a bordering state, the CVI shall include a statement verifying that "all animals identified on this certificate of veterinarian inspection have been examined and found to be free from Vesicular Stomatitis. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."

Cattle Identification Requirements: All cattle for exhibition must be identified by a USDA-issued metal eartag; a breed registration tattoo if the tattoo is legible and the registration certificate accompanies the animal; a breed registration eartag; or an ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag (including RFID).

Tuberculosis Testing Requirements:

- Test-eligible animals shall be all cattle of all ages.
- If the animal originates from a Tuberculosis-free state or zone, no tuberculosis test is required.
- If the animal originates from a state or zone that is classified as Modified Advanced Accredited (MAA), the animal shall be tuberculosis test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of arrival at the show. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall include all test results and dates of those tests.
- If the animal originates from a state or zone that is classified as Modified Accredited (MA), the animal shall originate from a herd which was negative on a whole herd test (all animals 12 months of age and older shall be tested) within the 12 months prior to the date of arrival at the show, and the individual animal to be exhibited (all ages) must be tested negative at least 60 days after the

whole herd test and within the 60 days prior to the date of arrival at the show. The Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall include all test results and dates of those tests.

Brucellosis Testing Requirements:

- Test-eligible animals shall be all unvaccinated cattle over eight months of age (269 days) and calfhood vaccinated animals over 14 months of age (449 days). Steers are exempt from brucellosis testing requirements.
- If the animal originates from a Brucellosis-free state, no brucellosis test is required.
- If the animal originates from a Brucellosis Class A, B or C state the animal shall be brucellosis test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of arrival at the show.

Vaccination Recommendations: It is highly recommended that all animals entering the show be immunized against IBR, PI3, BVD, BRSV, and rabies after January 1, 2014. ◀

ENTRY INFORMATION:

- Please fill out entry forms completely and accurately and send or upload to AHA with appropriate fees postmarked either by the **Early Bird Deadline of May 1** or online by the **Final Deadline of June 1**. Don't forget that June 1st is also the ownership deadline. **PAPER Entries will ONLY be accepted for the early bird entry deadline. All entries done after May 1 will need to be done ONLINE. (NO EXCEPTIONS TO THIS RULE.)**
- Online entry site: JrHereford.org
- All steers showing at the Junior National Hereford Expo must be registered by the American Hereford Association and out of a registered sire and dam. No steer certificates will be accepted, only registration papers.
- If you have not received your registration papers from AHA at least **one week prior** to May 1 or June 1, then please call the AHA records department immediately to check on your registrations or transfers. **"PENDING" or "APPLIED FOR" will not, under any circumstances, be accepted online in the registration column or on the JNHE entry form. YOU MUST have a registration number before completing online entry or mailing your entry to AHA. Please attach a copy of your registration paper for accuracy in processing your entries. This includes calves on the side of cows for the cow-calf pair show.**
- Please be sure to indicate whether your heifer(s) will show in the owned show, the bred-and-owned show, or both. Heifers exhibited in both shows will require two entry fees and one bedding fee. Also, remember to indicate if your heifer or bull qualifies for the Junior AI show (to qualify for the Junior AI Class, stated animal entered must be a result of semen received through the AHA Junior AI Program.)
- Entry and order forms are in the spring Advantage newsletter. Please complete the t-shirt, meal ticket and event order form at the same time you complete the entry and showmanship form (Sure Champ will be sponsoring one free shirt to each exhibitor; additional shirts are \$15) please mark the correct shirt size for each shirt ordered. The order form is due May 1. You will be able to order meal tickets, extra t-shirts, and showmanship entries via the online system till June 1st.

BARN AND TIE OUT POLICIES FOR 2014:

- 1) The Weis Expo Hall is where cattle will be stalled, this barn is air conditioned. Porta Cool Units WILL NOT BE allowed in the barns or in the tie out areas at the Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex. It was the decision of the NJHA Board to no longer allow Porta Cool Units due to the space issues in the barns.
- 2) All cattle will be tied on the panels provided in the tie out area and NO INDIVIDUAL PENS will be built in tie outs. We appreciate your cooperation with this and your help ensuring everyone has adequate space in tie outs.

- 3) Tents will be allowed in the tie out area on Friday, July 4 after 6 p.m., but must be removed by 10 a.m., on Sunday, July 6. Due to the storm that came through the tie outs a few years ago and the cattle that were in danger because of blown down tents and electricity issues, we appreciate your cooperation with no tents in tie outs after Sunday morning.
- 4) No generators inside the cattle barns.

STALLING POLICY FOR 2014 JNHE:

- NO HEREFORD cattle will be allowed on the grounds until Friday, July 4, at 6 p.m. You will be allowed to begin stall set-up on Saturday, July 5, at noon, however NO CATTLE will be allowed in the barns until Sunday morning, July 6. You will be stalled by state in the barn and advisors are in charge of stalling assignments within each state. **We ask that exhibitors do not set up stalls prior to your state advisor assigning the stall space. The state advisors will have final say in stalling for each state, so we ask that everyone cooperate with this new stalling process in order to get the week off to a good start.**
- ALL CATTLE EXHIBITING AT THE JNHE MUST BE STALLED WITH THE STATE THE JUNIOR EXHIBITOR IS FROM.

GENERAL RULES:

- 1) Exhibitor must be 7 years old and not 22 years old by January 1, 2014, and a member of the National Junior Hereford Association (NJHA). Dues are \$15 and must be paid prior to entry. Membership forms may be downloaded at jrhereford.org
- 2) All animals must be registered with the American Hereford Association (AHA).
- 3) Each entry, except in the bred-and-owned bull show must be owned solely by the junior exhibitor(s) and in his/her recorded ownership before **June 1**. Siblings may jointly own animals, provided both are members of the NJHA and meet NJHA age requirements. No animal is eligible to compete if recorded in joint ownership (other than the sibling rule and bred-and-owned bull rule), and no joint ownership with farm name or family name.
- 4) Horned or de-horned animals are eligible for the horned owned breeding show; polled cattle or cattle with scurs are eligible for the polled owned breeding show. Horned and polled cow-calf pairs, steers, bred-and-owned bulls and bred-and-owned heifers will show together in their respective shows. Scurs, if present, must be loose and not firmly attached to the head; they must not be removed or tampered with.
- 5) **EARLY BIRD ENTRY FEES ARE \$40 PER ENTRY if postmarked by May 1.** ONLINE ENTRIES processed by June 1 are \$60 per head. A one time bedding fee per entry is \$50 and this includes bedding for tie outs. Mail entries to the Department of Youth Activities, American Hereford Association, P.O. Box 014059, Kansas City, MO 64101.

- 6) **Final Entry and Ownership Deadline is June 1.** All animals must be registered and transferred prior to the June 1 entry and ownership deadline date. No late transfers or entries will be accepted. **Entries with "pending" listed, as the registration number will not be accepted and entry will be refused. This includes calves showing on the sides of cows in the cow-calf pair show.** Entry fees are non-refundable.
- 7) All heifers, bulls and cow-calf pairs must be in place in the barn and processed by 3 p.m., Sunday, July 6. Steer check-in will begin at 3 p.m. All steers must be in place in the barn and processed by 5 p.m. Sunday, July 6.
- 8) Original registration certificate must be presented at check-in. All animals will have tattoos checked. Tattoos that are missing, illegible, altered, incorrect and/or in any other way disagree with the official AHA records will be justifiable cause for disqualification of entry. **Check tattoos well before leaving for the JNHE.**
- 9) Entries must meet Pennsylvania health regulations. All animals must have an official health certificate. Refer to Pennsylvania health requirements at JrHereford.org.
- 10) Exhibitor must show his/her own animals unless excused in writing by the AHA Youth Director. Only exhibitors who are in attendance at the JNHE and are physically unable to show the animals due to illness or injury will be excused. Owner may secure another junior member to show his/her animals if excused or if exhibitor has more than one entry in the same class. It is recommended that if you have more than one animal being shown in a class you utilize a fellow junior from your own state to assist. No adult or fellow junior may assist exhibitor in showing.
- 11) Exhibitor must wear official show shirt in both showmanship and in the entire cattle show along with entry numbers on chest and back. Additional show shirts may be purchased for \$15. (See enclosed order form)
- 12) Exhibitor must follow AHA fitting rules as stated in the official "Rules, Regulations and Bylaws" of the American Hereford Association.
- 13) State herdsman (neatness, decoration, workmanship and cooperation) will be judged.
- 14) If all requirements aren't met, the NJHA Board and Youth Director reserve the right to disqualify any entry.
- 15) All persons making entries in the show shall agree to abide by all the rules and regulations as outlined and will not hold the American Hereford Association or the 2014 Junior National Hereford Expo organizers responsible for accident, loss or injury to any person, animal or article.
- 16) **No farm signs or videos may be displayed at the stalls.** Family signs may be displayed if junior exhibitor(s) names are included.

- 17) There will be five showmanship divisions: pre-peewee, peewee, junior, intermediate and senior. All contestants (except pre-peewee contestants) must pre-enter by June 1. There will be no entries accepted at the show. The entry fee is \$5.
- 18) Calves at the side of cow-calf pairs may show in separate heifer or bull shows, however additional entry fees will apply.
- 19) Breeding cattle will not be weighed or measured.
- 20) Spring 2014 EPDs will be used. EPDs for breeding cattle will be provided to the judge for him to use at his discretion. Junior members will only have EPDs if they are compliant with Whole Herd TPR or purchased an animal from a Whole Herd TPR breeder. If you feel that you are not compliant with Whole Herd TPR, please call the AHA records department immediately.
- 21) Steers will be weighed at processing. This data will be used when breaking classes and will be provided to the judge.
- 22) Steers will be exhibited by birthdate and weight.
- 23) A carcass evaluation competition will be held in conjunction with the steer show, with carcass information gathered on live steers through ultrasound. This will also occur during steer processing.
- 24) Horned and polled owned heifers will be shown separately, alternating at the divisions. Horned and polled bred-and-owned heifers will show together in one show, with one grand champion bred-and-owned heifer. Bred-and-owned heifers may also enter the owned show, but must indicate this on the entry form and must pay an additional entry fee.
- 25) Due to Pennsylvania Farm Show Complex regulations **NO DOGS** will be allowed in the showing or cattle barns.
- 26) Any animal a junior enters may be used in the team-fitting competition and/or be asked to be used in the judging contest.
- 27) When entering contests be sure to use your age as of January 1 of the current year.
- 28) All champion and reserves at the JNHE will be DNA tested.
- 29) It is a policy of the NJHA board of directors that if an animal gets loose in the showing, an exhibitor will be given two chances to regain control of said animal. After the third instance exhibitor and animal will be dismissed from the showing by an NJHA board member or AHA staff member.

HEIFER RULES:

- 1) Heifer classes will include:
 - Spring Calf – calved on or after 3/1/14
 - Junior Calf – calved 1/1/14 to 2/28/14
 - Winter Calf – calved 11/1/13 to 12/31/13
 - Senior Calf – calved 8/1/13 to 10/31/13
 - Late Summer Yearling – calved 6/16/13 to 7/31/13
 - Early Summer Yearling – calved 5/1/13 to 6/15/13

Spring Yearling – calved 3/1/13 to 4/30/13
 Junior Yearling – calved 1/1/13 to 2/28/13
 Senior Yearling – calved 8/1/12 to 12/31/12

- 2) If the number of entries warrant, classes will be divided.
- 3) Division breaks will be decided after all entries are processed.

SPECIAL COW-CALF RULES:

- 1) Cows born prior to Aug. 1, 2012. No maximum age for cows. Calf must be her natural calf, no more than 270 days in age as of the day of the show. Born on or after October 14, 2013. There will be a bred-and-owned cow-calf class and standard cow-calf classes. Winners of the bred-and-owned and standard classes will compete for champion pair.
- 2) Polled and horned pairs will be combined in one cow-calf show.
- 3) Bred-and-owned cow-calf class – Exhibitor must be the breeder and owner of both the cow and calf. The same cow-calf pair may not show in both the bred-and-owned and standard cow-calf classes.
- 4) Standard cow-calf classes – Exhibitor must be the breeder of the calf, and must have been the recorded owner of the cow since June 1, 2014.
- 5) Bull and heifer calves on cow-calf pairs are eligible to show in individual classes. They must be entered individually and pay the additional entry fee. The bred-and-owned bull show ownership rules apply to bull calves in the cow-calf show.
- 6) The champion and reserve champion bred-and-owned cow-calf pair and the champion and reserve standard cow-calf pair will show for the overall champion cow-calf pair.
- 7) There will be no nurse cows allowed in the cow-calf pair show or stalled in the barns.

BRED-AND-OWNED SHOW RULES:

- 1) To be eligible for the bred-and-owned show, the exhibitor(s) must have owned the entry's dam at the time of conception and must be listed as the breeder on the registration certificate.
- 2) Bred-and-owned heifers calved after August 1, 2012 are eligible.
- 3) Bred-and-owned heifers may also show in the owned show. An additional entry fee will be charged.
- 4) Horned and polled bred-and-owned heifers will show together.
- 5) Bred-and-owned bulls calved after August 1, 2012 are eligible. There will not be a class for 2-year-old bulls.
- 6) Horned and polled bulls will show together.
- 7) Bred-and-owned bulls must have been bred by the junior member/exhibitor, but may be owned jointly with an adult/farm, provided that the junior/exhibitor is the sole breeder, and is officially recorded as a current owner of that bull.
- 8) All bulls calved before January 1, 2014, must be shown with a nose lead.

STEER RULES:

- 1) All steers showing at the Junior National Hereford Expo must be registered by the American Hereford Association and out of a registered sire and dam. No steer certificates will be accepted, only registration papers.
- 2) Steer classes will be divided by date of birth and weight. Classes will be determined after check-in. **There will be a prospect steer show and the weight cut off for prospect steers is 950 lb.**

ULTRASOUND CARCASS STEER RULES:

- 1) All steers are automatically entered in the carcass evaluation without further entry fee.
- 2) Carcass information will be gathered on live steers during processing through the use of ultrasound technology. Steers will first compete in the visual show, with champions selected. Following the visual steer show, the top 10 steers in the carcass evaluation will be ranked and champions will be named.

SPECIAL Classes:

- 1) **Junior AI** – Classes of females and bulls resulting from the AHA Junior AI Program will be held in conjunction with the show. An entry fee is not required to exhibit in this class, but entries must be indicated on the entry form. All Junior AI entries will show in one class of heifers and one class of bulls
- 2) **State Group of Five** – Five animals from one state, owned by three or more exhibitors and representing not more than two animals per exhibitor. Any combination of steers, heifers or bulls is acceptable. There may be only one group per state.
- 3) **Breeder Group of Three** – Three animals bred by the same junior or adult breeder as designated on the registration paper. No steer are allowed.
- 4) **Female Get-of-Sire** – Four females sired by one bull regardless of owner.
- 5) **Premier Adult and Junior Breeder** – Award points are computed from winnings in breeding animal **Classes**: 5 points for 1st place, 4 points for 2nd, 3 points for 3rd, 2 points for 4th, and 1 point for 5th place. Points are given only for individual classes; no points for champions or groups. The Senior Premier Breeder Award is given to the adult or farm with the top point total. The Junior Premier Breeder Award is given to the junior member with the top point total, regardless to the number exhibited. Computed the same as the National Hereford Open Shows.
- 6) **Premier Exhibitor** – Award points are computed from winnings in breeding animal **Classes**: 5 points for 1st place, 4 points for 2nd, 3 points for 3rd, 2 points for 4th, and 1 point for 5th place. Points are given only for individual classes; no points for champions or groups. The Premier Exhibitor Award is given to the junior with the top point total, regardless of the number exhibited. Computed the same as the National Hereford Open Shows. ◀
